#### Sarbanes-Oxley: Two Years Later

In the wake of corporate scandals involving Enron, WorldCom, and other public companies that threatened to undermine investor confidence and questioned the integrity of our capital markets, Congress overwhelmingly passed--and President Bush signed--the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002. At its core, this broad-based federal legislation was designed to change the ways that public companies conduct business. Through this legislation, Congress hoped to dramatically change corporate governance and corporate ethics, while at the same time ensuring that accounting firms be independent of the companies that they audit and that lawyers exercise enhanced professional responsibility in the public company context. Sarbanes-Oxley will have been in effect for two years in July 2004. This panel will discuss some of the essential provisions of Sarbanes-Oxley, identify key concepts and provisions not included in Sarbanes-Oxley, and explore whether, at its two-year anniversary, Sarbanes-Oxley has accomplished or will accomplish its lofty ambitions.

## **Reparations Talk: Evaluating Reparations for Slavery**

Discussion of reparations for slavery has dramatically increased in the legal academy and there are even a few lawsuits that are gaining attention. There is now sufficient literature to have a serious discussion about the moral and legal case for reparations, as well as about the form they might take. This panel discusses the moral case for reparations and more recent Jim Crow-era racial crimes, as well as the legal (e.g., statutes of limitation and standing) and moral problems (e.g., requesting current taxpayers to pay for reparations), and concludes with discussion of how reparationists have responded to those problems. Although both sides will be presented, this panel will present a sympathetic and compelling case for reparations.
