### **Care and Feeding of Adjunct Faculty**

### **Developments in Caribbean Law and Legal Education**

The Commonwealth Caribbean is undergoing significant judicial and legislative developments in its national and regional institutions. With the impending establishment of the Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) and the Caribbean Single Market and Economy (CSM&E) in 2005, nations within the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) are tailoring their internal legal mechanisms to facilitate regional cooperation and growth.
